ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you. Good morning. My name is Karl Palmer. I am the Acting Deputy Director of the Safer Consumer Products --

[Whereupon the teleconference operator breaks in to the Court Reporter's audio connection, and a brief off-the-record conversation between Operator and Court Reporter occurs.]

"You will now be placed into conference."

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: -- Program of the Department of Toxic Substances Control. I will be the Hearing Officer for today's proceedings. We have modified the standard public hearing process to provide an opportunity for a virtual hearing in response to the COVID-19 emergency. It is our intent to ensure that anyone who has a comment can provide oral testimony today. You will be able to indicate your intention to speak and provide an oral comment.

If for any reason you cannot be heard, please submit written comments to the CalSAFER portal at calsafer.dtsc.ca.gov. Or through the DTSC Regulations email address at regs@dtsc.ca.gov or through the postal system.

For the record, today is May 15th, 2020 and the

time is 9:02 AM, Pacific Standard Time.

Under the provisions of the Administrative

Procedure Act, this is the time and place set for the

presentation of statements, arguments and contentions,

orally or in writing for or against the Department's

proposal to amend California Code of Regulations, Title 22,

Division 4.5, Chapter 55 by adding section 69511.4 and

amending Sections 66260.11 and 69511.

This proposal pertains to listing Priority

Products under the Safer Consumer Products Regulations

approved by the Office of Administrative Law and filed with

the Secretary of State on August 28th, 2013.

The entire proceedings will be recorded. The recording, as well as any exhibits or evidence presented at this hearing will be incorporated into the rulemaking file and will be reviewed prior to the final approval of the regulations by the Department and the Office of Administrative Law.

The purpose of today's hearing is to accept public comment. Persons who wish to speak today should press star 1 on their telephone key pad and the operator will place them in the queue. Speakers will be heard in the order of the queue. Anyone else wishing to speak at the hearing will have an opportunity after the persons in the queue have been heard.

Persons presenting testimony at this hearing will not be sworn in, nor will we engage in cross-examination of those providing public comment. The Department will not respond to comments made today, but will address all comments in writing and include them as part of the rulemaking record available to the public.

We ask that you restrict your comments to the regulations being considered today.

You may submit written comments to us through the Department's Safer Consumer Products Information Management System, also referred to as CalSAFER, at calsafer.dtsc.ca.gov until 11:59 p.m. Pacific Standard Time tonight.

You may also email your comments to regs@dtsc.ca.gov. You may also provide written comments to the following address, which is also provided in the public notice. The Department of Toxic Substances Control, Office of the Legislation and Regulatory Review, PO Box 806, Sacramento, California 95812-0806. Comments postmarked with today's date will be considered to be received by today's date.

The proposed regulations were duly noticed in the California Regulatory Notice Register and copies of the notice, proposed regulation text and the Initial Statement of Reasons were made available to interested parties who

requested such notice. The proposed regulations are also available as proposed regulations through the Department's website, www.dtsc.ca.gov and at the Department's headquarters office, regional offices, the state library and depository libraries.

Persons wishing to speak at this hearing should have indicated their intent to speak as witnesses and be placed in the queue. Testimony will be heard in the order of the queue. If you have not yet indicated your intent to speak, press star 1 and the operator will place you in the queue and you will have an opportunity to speak after the speakers in the queue have been heard.

The list of participants of this call and a list of those submitting written comments will be used to notify interested parties of any post-hearing changes to the proposed regulations. Please note that unless you specifically request notification by mail, we will be using email addresses to notify interested parties of any post-hearing changes to the proposed regulations.

To enable the audience to hear and to ensure that your comments are entered into the record, we ask the speakers to speak when called upon by the operator. Please begin by stating your name and the organization you represent. Please spell your last name and indicate the proposed regulatory section that each comment addresses.

We also ask that if you are submitting written comments, in addition to your oral comments, either limit your oral comments to those items not covered in your written comments or summarize your written comments.

With that, let us begin to hear comments on the proposed regulations.

The first witness in the queue to testify is

Melody LaBella. Operator, please open the line for Melody.

MS. LABELLA: Hi. Good morning. Can you hear

me?

11 ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Yes, we can hear 12 you.

MS. LABELLA: Great. Thank you. So I'm Melody LaBella, L-A-B-E-L-L-A. And I'm the Resource Recovery Program Manager for Central Contra Costa Sanitary District. We're a wastewater collection and treatment agency serving about 500,000 residents in Central Contra Costa County, which is in the Eastern portion of the San Francisco Bay Area.

And I'm participating here this morning to support the DTSC in this proposed listing under the Safer Consumer Products Program for PFAS in carpets and rugs.

So many harmful chemicals in consumer products have a pathway to the public wastewater system and PFAS in carpets and rugs is no exception. And just to give some

perspective, this pathway to wastewater for harmful chemicals in consumer products involves what gets flushed down the toilet, rinsed down indoor drains, or directed in some way to the public sewer system such as popping a manhole cover in the street and discharging a liquid stream that way. It can come to us in many different ways.

As I detailed in our comment letter, when carpets and rugs are cleaned the liquid waste stream generated from that activity is almost always directed to a public sewer system. And that is yet another way that PFAS can be transferred into our systems.

Our treatment plants aren't designed to remove highly stable chemicals like PFAS and to upgrade our plants to do so would cost our treatment plant alone hundreds of millions of dollars, just in capital to do so. So any PFAS coming into our plant remains in the treated effluent discharged to waterways and in the solid streams that are produced.

Beyond that, PFAS can move on in our recycled water supplies. As our drought-prone state moves toward the widespread adoption of advanced treated wastewater to augment public drinking water supplies, removing harmful chemicals in consumer products that can reach public wastewater systems is more crucial than ever.

Depending where you're at in our state, what you

flush or rinse down your indoor drain today could become part of the source supply for the water that you drink tomorrow. It took us more than 70 years to work PFAS into so many consumer products and now it's time to work it back out, so let's begin.

Thank you so much.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Melody, for your comments.

The next witness in the queue to testify is Suzanne Hume. Operator, please open the line for Suzanne.

OPERATOR: The line is open. Ms. Hume, please unmute your phone. Your line is open. Suzanne Hume, we're not able to hear right you. If you could pick up your hand set or check your mute button. It looks like her line disconnected.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Okay. It looks, at this point like there's no one else in the queue. If there is anyone who would like to present additional comments related to this rulemaking, please press star 1 now on your telephone to indicate that you wish to join the queue and that you have a comment to make.

We'll wait a few minutes, seeing if Suzanne calls back in or if anyone else would like to comment.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: At this time, it

looks like the next person in the queue is Joanne Brasch.

Operator, please open the line for Joanne.

OPERATOR: Joanne, your line is open.

MS. BRASCH: Thank you very much. My name is

Joanne Brasch of the California Product Stewardship

Council. We are a non-profit in California that represents
a lot of local governments (indecipherable) who are engaged
in end-of-life solutions for products in our waste stream.

Today, we would like to add our support for DTSC in listing carpet with PFASs as a Priority Product under the Safer Consumer Products Program. We also would like to suggest including outdoor carpets and we'd like to cite action that's been happening at the local level to inspire more action at the state level.

As detailed in our public comment letter, to be uploaded to the website, there have been specific local ordinances and programs specifically designed to address this Product of Concern.

Again, thank you very much to DTSC for their hard work that was done to get us to this point.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Joanne, for your comments.

Next in the queue is Anna Reed. Operator, please open the queue for Anna.

OPERATOR: Anna, your line is open.

MS. REED: Good morning, this is Anna Reed with Natural Resources Defense Council. We also support SCP's proposed listing of carpets and rugs containing PFAS as a Priority Product. The profile does an excellent job of supporting this product-chemical combination as a Priority Product. It provides both potential adverse effects and potential exposure, both are well documented. And our comments will also be submitted in written form in further detail. Thank you.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Anna, for your comments.

Next in the queue is Greg Kester. Operator, please open the queue for Greg.

OPERATOR: Greq, your line is open.

MR. KESTER: Thank you. I represent the California Association of Sanitation Agencies, CASA. And we also strongly support the DTSC proposal to list carpets and rugs containing PFAS as Priority Products. Many of these chemicals have a pathway to the public sewer system. In particular, anything applied to carpeting and rugs is the liquid waste being generated from residential and commercial (indecipherable) public wastewater systems. These treatments are (indecipherable).

(Background noise drowns out audio.)

Wastewater treatment plants provide

(indecipherable) services that are (indecipherable) by

manufacturers such as in the (indecipherable) textile

industries. And we strongly agree with the source control

measures that proposed by DTSC rather than imposing

unnecessary (indiscernible) on the wastewater and other

(indecipherable). So thank you very much.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Greg, for your comments.

At this time, the queue does not show that anyone else wishes to speak. If there's anyone who would like to speak and add additional comments related to this rulemaking please press star 1 to indicate that you would like to be in the queue. It is now 9:15. We will wait until 9:20 to see if anyone else would like to add comments at this hearing.

(Pause for additional comments.)

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Okay, the next in the queue is Suzanne Hume. Operator, can you please open the line for Suzanne.

OPERATOR: Yes. Suzanne, your line is now open.

MS. HUME: Hi, everyone. And thank you for this,

it is so important. My name is Suzanne Hume. And I'm the

Founder and Educational Director for CleanEarth4Kids.org.

We work to protect clean air, clean water and nontoxic lands.

We're asking California to please classify PFAs in carpets and synthetic turf, artificial turf, fake grass, however you want to call it, as hazardous. We must do this to protect our children, our athletes, our workers, our water.

Thank you so much for taking this important action. PFAs must be classified as a Priority Product for a variety reasons. Also we know synthetic turf carpets are flammable, which automatically would put them in as a hazard, a physical hazard. We worry about risk of inhalation, dermal, many others. So we will be submitting our written comments today. And please support our kids, our water, our air and list PFAs and synthetic turf, artificial grass, however you want to call it as a Priority Product.

Thank you so much for all of your tireless work. Have a great day.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Suzanne, for your comments.

At this point, there are no other people in the queue. We will wait a few minutes to see if anyone else would like to comment. If you would, please press star 1 on

your phone to indicate so and we will put you in the queue.

(Pause for additional comments.)

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: We're going to keep the line open for a few minutes, even though no one has indicated they wish to speak, because we want to ensure that anyone who wishes to speak has an opportunity. I would also remind you that if for some reason you are having difficulty entering this conference, you have other options. You could comment in writing by either sending your comments to our CalSAFER portal online, to our email address or using the US mail as I indicated in the opening statement.

Operator, it appears that Suzanne Hume wants to make another comment, could you open the line for her?

OPERATOR: Okay, one moment. All right,

16 Suzanne's line is open.

MS. HUME: Okay, hi. Thank you, CleanEarth4Kids. So sorry, Suzanne Hume calling. When you had said before that there weren't any other callers, I had already called, so I called again. I just want to make sure that everyone is heard, because there were other people on the list that said they wanted to call in.

Thank you so much for your time. I appreciate it. Yes, so my original comment stands. I don't want to take up time. Please list PFAs as Priority Products

including carpets and synthetic turf. Yes, very important, thank you so much.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Suzanne, for your comments.

And we will keep the line open for a few more minutes. No one has indicated that they wish to speak at this time, but we'll wait around a little to see if anyone would like to contribute.

(Pause for additional comments.)

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Operator, it looks like the next person in the queue is Diane Wolkey. Please open the line for Diane.

OPERATOR: Ms. Wolkey, your line is now open.

(Background noise drowns out speaker on and off.)

MS. WOLKEY: (Indecipherable.) as well as an activist in California. (Indecipherable) please emphasize including in synthetic turf (indecipherable) these products, synthetic turf is carpeting. It is manufactured in the same places that conventional indoor carpet is manufactured. It's used indoors as well as outdoors. It's been proven to contain PFAS in multiple laboratory studies.

So I'm asking that you please support cleaning up

turf in your regulatory language. Thank you so much.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank, you Diane, for your comment.

Again, at this time there's no one identified that they'd like to speak, but we'll wait a few minutes to ensure that anyone who wishes to speak has an opportunity.

(Pause for additional comments.)

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: The next person wishing to speak is Gail Brice. Operator, please open the line for Gail.

OPERATOR: Gail, your line is now open.

MS. BRICE: Hi, I'm Gail Brice. I've been involved in carpet recycling for the last 10 years. And I also serve on the stewardship committee, the advisory committee, but these comments are my own.

I have submitted comments and I just wanted to highlight here that the need to, when looking at end of life of carpets to fully ban carpet from landfills in California, because they are a source of PFAS in the leachate, which is often sent to wastewater treatment plants. But rather there should be significant efforts and resources dedicated to carpet recycling. And ensuring that, this is a much more advantageous alternative when it comes to control of PFAS, can be done safely. And that the resources have provided and the regulations are stated such

that the end of life focuses on recycling and reuse of carpets rather than disposal to landfills.

And of course basically right now, there's not any incineration of carpeting in California. And that should continue to be done too. All right, thanks a lot.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you for your comments, Gail.

The next speaker in the queue is John Bottorff. Operator, please open the line for John.

OPERATOR: John Bottorff, your line is now open.

MR. BOTTORFF: Hi. My name is John Bottorff with CleanEarth4Kids. And the CDC says that PFA exposure may interfere with the body's natural hormones, increase cholesterol levels, affect the immune system and increase the risk of some cancers. The CDC recommends 10 times lower the amount of exposure than the EPA.

As any material with PFA (indecipherable) particularly (indecipherable) carpet, poses a risk to health of the public. Turf particularly represents potential hundreds of thousands of pounds of plastic, which will end up in our landfills. This is not safe. And it definitely poses a risk to children. I absolutely ask the DTSC to add turf and all plastic carpeting into this regulation. Thank you.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, John,

for your comments.

Again, there's no one in the queue at this time, but we will wait a few minutes to see if anyone would like to add comments. Reminder that if you'd like to comment, please press star 1 on your phone and you'll be placed into the queue.

(Pause for additional comments.)

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: The next person in the queue is Heidi Sanborn. Operator, please open the line for Heidi.

OPERATOR: Heidi Sanborn, your line is now open.

MS. SANBORN: Thank you. This is Heidi Sanborn, the Director of the National Stewardship Action Council. We have sponsored two bills on carpet in California that have both been signed by the Governor, the last one being AB 729 in 2019. It introduced the first eco-modulated fee in the country, which would put a price facing the consumer on carpet that would tell the consumer which carpets are less toxic, more recyclable and those that are not. The higher the fee, the worse the environmental impact. And the goal was to drive toxics out of carpet.

It is absolutely, we support the comments of Gail Brice and the CleanEarth4Kids and others who have commented that the astroturf absolutely needs to be included in this.

These products absolutely need to be listed. The people are unaware of their exposures. The way it is now is that it is unacceptable. And these are dangerous chemicals.

So we strongly support the listing of these products, and the commenter about the disposal being the problem is absolutely right. We're seeing PFASs showing up in landfill leachate all over the country. And it's actually closing landfills and putting liability on landfill operators, which is unsustainable in terms of cost etcetera.

So we support the state's efforts to list these products.

ACTING DEP. DIRECTOR PALMER: Thank you, Heidi, for your comments.

Operator, it looks like John -- whoops, he disappeared. Again, there is no one in the queue at this point, but we will wait a few minutes to see if anyone would like to add comments. Please press star 1 on your phone if you would like to be entered into the queue.
